Students are permitted to reschedule one lesson per session when a 24 hour notice of cancellation is given. Any additional cancellations will result in the forfeit of that lesson unless the slot can be filled, as instructors are guaranteed payment for each lesson scheduled. At least 24 hours notice allows for the possible filling of the lesson slot. Unfortunately there will be no exceptions made.
